About my childhood friend, John. Not long ago, he texted me concerning a request from his pastor in southern Illinois. His pastor had challenged the church to do things in their service to Christ that made them slip out of their comfort zones. For John, this meant for him to speak publicly about Jesus, more specifically, bring a Sunday message to his church. Not knowing where to begin, my friend asked for prayer and I assured him I would be praying for him.

I called John the evening of the morning he spoke. He was encouraged and believed he had done the best he could do, and hoped the Lord was

pleased. He shared I'd be able to listen the next day, "If I wanted..." IF I WANTED?!?!?! Absolutely, I told him.

The next day, I listened to this message – The story of David and Goliath. King Saul, not knowing how to handle Goliath (a giant over 9 feet tall with seemingly impenetrable armor and massive weaponry), put forth a bribe to anyone willing to fight this giant that entailed marriage into the royal family and tax exempt status for his father's family. David was a young shepherd boy with no military training or experience, but he also had no fear. As David does battle with Goliath, we know David wins the

fight. The point my friend makes is this, David may have fought this giant, but it wasn't his giant to fight....

This giant was a problem. But he was Saul's problem. David could have walked away from the battlefield. After all, he was sent by his father, Jesse, to bring some supplies to his brother and bring home news of the battle. He could have just thrown his hands up and said, "it's not my problem" and went home. But he didn't.

I have often said, and stand by it, that this David and Goliath story reminds us that God will fight for us, and in His name, He will help us face our giants.

However, this powerful insight reminds us that God not only wants to fight for us, be our protector and provider, but we have responsibility to help others overcome their giants as well. David is mentioned as "a man after God's own heart." He loved the Lord. His relationship with him was not new on that battlefield with Goliath. David's relationship goes many years back. He tells Saul while he had protected his sheep, he had fought a

lion, he had fought a bear, slaying them both. As God had been with him in the past, he'd be with him now, and he would be victorious in slaying this giant, because he "came in the name of the Lord."

David relied on what God had done for him in the past. Seeing His protection and provision then gave him the wherewithal to face, not only his own problems of protection for the sheep, but also the strength, knowledge, wisdom, and

peace that God would help him conquer Saul's giant as well.

As we think about David and Goliath, let's keep in mind our responsibilities to be Jesus in our world. Let us strive to see, not only our own giants, but the giants in other people's lives. It may be that our Christian walk and experience carries whatever is needed to slay someone else's giant, and thus bring them into a closer walk with Christ.

Abby Neace has found her calling — helping others

Doing extraordinary things is not uncommon for 11-year-old Abby Neace.

When Abby was only four years old, she stood on a chair and read Bible scripture to residents at Valley Health Care in Chilhowie, Virginia. She's read to them every Christmas since then.

So, it was no surprise when the sixth-grade student at Cornerstone Christian Academy in Abingdon accepted a challenge from her school's grammar principal, Dana Dando, last year.

The sixth-grade class assignment was to organize a community project during the summer after reading the book, "Do Hard Things: A Teenage Rebellion Against Low Expectations" by Alex Harris and Brett Harris.

Written by teens for teens, the book inspires youth to think outside the box to help change the world. "We encourage our students to reach out to people who are hurting and needy, and this is one way they can do that at their young ages," said Dando.

The open-ended assignment allowed

students to come up with their own ideas for projects.

Abby said half way through the book, she realized her best project would be one that helped the sick.

Using her own allowance money, the student helped her parents purchase personal care items for 20 gift bags to give to patients at Wellmont Cancer Institute in Bristol, Tennessee. After working months to compile the gift bags, Abby finished presenting her gifts to the patients earlier this month.

"We offered to help her purchase some of the items, but Abby wanted to buy the supplies with her allowance money as it became available," said her father Bob Neace, who is pastor at Abingdon First Church of God.

"I am thrilled to see her taking an active part in doing things to help other people."

Her mother, Kathy Neace, said the project was a perfect fit for her daughter. "Abby has always wanted to become a doctor and oncology is her interest."

Abby packed the bags with lotions, shampoos, water, hand sanitizers, tissues, candy, gum,

notepads and pencils, and peanut butter crackers.

To remind the patients there are people in the community who care about them, she decorated a handmade book mark for each bag and included a handwritten encouragement note with a Bible verse and a picture she'd drawn.

"When I was younger, I took care of my family when they were sick and that was important to me. I've always wanted to help the sick and those hurting," she said.

"I chose to do a project for God that was too big to accomplish alone, but I feel it will have amazing long term pay offs in my walk with God," Abby wrote in a school essay about her assignment.

"I felt really good because I knew I had helped others and that's what God wants me to do."
